Leonard Green, 96, of Cocoa, FL, departed from this world on June 12, 2021 after a courageously fought battle with leukemia.

He was predeceased by his parents, Ben and Goldie Green; and his sister, Edith Hooser.

Survivors include his sister, Sandra Trees; a daughter, Sheri Ranson (husband Terry); a granddaughter, Emily Bush (husband Matthew); and a great-granddaughter, Anastasia.

Leonard was born in Chicago, IL on April 4, 1925. He spent his childhood years on a family farm in rural Michigan. At the age of 15, he and his family moved to Florida.

Leonard was an Air Force veteran of both WWII and Korea. He served his country with pride and distinction. Like many of his generation, he was resourceful and could fix anything, or create useful items from scratch. Leonard was a technician at Cape Kennedy Space Center for many years and witnessed the historic Apollo 13 launch. He obtained a graph showing the astronauts' heartbeats, pulse and respiration during liftoff, which he treasured. After KSC, Leonard became a successful realtor.

He enjoyed occasional family vacations, and travel into the Blue Ridge Mountains ignited an interest in rockhounding, which led to a lapidary hobby. His craftsmanship and artistry appeared at gem shows along the East Coast and was admired by thousands.

He will be deeply missed by all who knew him.

Leonard will rest in the good company of other service members at Cape Canaveral National Cemetery in Mims.



June made this beautiful sterling silver pendant adorned with a wire bezel and a double wire bale.










ROCKHOUNDING IN UTAH-MAY 2021

My family and I recently returned from a fantastic rockhounding trip to Utah. At the end of May, the four of us climbed into our motorhome and headed west with my son's beloved 1972 International Harvester Scout in tow. The goal: to see as much of Utah and its rocks, minerals, and fossils as possible in the two weeks we had for the trip. The driving took us a little more than 3 days each way so our exploring time was limited. We tried to make the most of the time we had.



Our first stop was boondock camping on some remote BLM (Bureau of Land Management) land off route 95. I carefully planned and packed all the food and water we would need for most of the trip. Having been to rural Utah before, we knew that services were few and far between. We parked the motorhome and spent a day and a half driving around the numerous dirt roads in the truck, hiking, and collecting agate, jasper and petrified wood along with a few unidentified finds. The area was beautiful. And completely empty of other humans. We would've liked to stay longer but we had to move on.

Our next stop was Delta where we spent our only


night at an RV park. Delta also has a rock shop that we visited. From that area we travelled to Dugway Geode Beds, Topaz Mountain, and the U-Dig Trilobite mine. Getting to Dugway Geode Beds involved a long drive on dirt roads but we came away with dozens of geodes so it was well worth it as far as I'm concerned. A spare tire and extra food and water are recommended in case of emergency. This area is extremely remote and there is no cell phone service (not on our phones anyway). Luckily, we made it there and back safely. The next morning, we made a quick visit to Topaz Mountain where we were able to find a few decent topaz crystals. Unfortunately, the paid mine area was closed when we arrived so we had to go to the free area. That meant we were on our own to



figure out where go and what to look for. Then it was off to the trilobite mine. We opted to go to the paid digging site because they offer guidance and they expose fresh material daily. There are also free collecting sites in the area but we didn't check those out since our time was limited. In two hours, we each found a couple dozen trilobites. They were mostly

small but I was happy with my finds. It was hot and breaking those rocks open with a hammer was hard work especially on my back so two hours was plenty of time to spend there. If you want to find large or unusual specimens you probably need to be very lucky or spend more time there than we did.

Next, it was off to Vernon where we easily collected a bucket of wonderstone. There was plenty of it just laying loose on the surface but you could see where people had worked at trying to chip off exposed chunks from the hill. My son tried breaking off pieces but quickly gave that up. A rock hammer and miners pick didn't seem up to the job. We found plenty of really pretty pieces just laying around waiting to be picked up.





Utah Trip (continued)

The last areas we visited were Yellow Cat Flat and the Moab area. The Yellow Cat Flat area was a lot of fun. We drove around the dirt roads, got a little lost, and found lots of agate, jasper and petrified wood. When we went to the Moab area, we found it to be unexpectedly crowded. We hadn't been there in four years and it has changed so much! Sadly, I wasn't able to stop at the rock shop in town since we were driving the motorhome and there was a lot of traffic plus road construction. There was absolutely nowhere to park.

To sum up, we had a great vacation and came home with a few hundred pounds of rocks! I could've spent a month happily exploring but unfortunately, we had to get home. Now I have months more fun in store for me as I cut open geodes and slab and polish my finds.

Club Purpose:


The purpose of this club is to foster interest in and to promote knowledge and appreciation of minerals, gems, fossils, and the earth sciences.
